### **Time Traveling Luncheons**

Penn State's Comparative Literature Luncheon is a weekly informal lunchtime gathering of students, faculty, and other members of the University. Each Monday, there is a twenty-minute presentation by a visitor or a local speaker on a topic related to any humanities discipline. Lunch is provided, and there is a question and answer session at the end of each lecture, providing attendees with a chance to directly communicate with the lecturer. The Luncheon series also welcomes guest speakers from around the world to give presentations on various topics of global literary research.

On Monday March 14<sup>th</sup>, Biwu Shang, a distinguished research fellow of English at China's Jiaotong University in Shanghai presented a lecture titled "Unnatural Narratives in Contemporary Chinese Time Travel Fiction". His talk was focused on the patterns and means of time travel, as well as the unnaturalness derived from such perspectives, such as self-contradictory narration and multi-person narration. He explained the consequences and values of being unnatural, and offered a way to naturalize it by suggesting the intersection of unnatural narratology with ethical narratology.

He also added that time travel fiction in China is extremely popular and many of these novels are made into television dramas.

The festival took place in The State Theatre and other University locations and featured a variety of film categories, including: international student films, workshops, documentaries, horror shorts, and much more. The series was a way for students to get involved and be inspired to produce films and create conversation based on these films.

After the film was shown, the audience was invited to ask questions about the film and talk about issues involving the film, in their community and internationally, with the director.

The group has also held events at Ohio University similar to the "CTFF" in State College.

Jordan says in the future "he hopes to do something on the road but also wants to have a larger festival similar to Thaw in the spring."

## **Spring Break and Peace Talks in Cuba**By Bridget Adduce

While Penn State students and faculty enjoyed their Spring breaks on various beaches and in beautiful cities, one of the university's newest faculty members, Dr. Alex Fattal, spent his time off in a rather unique location. Dr. Fattal, who joined Penn State's Department of Film-Video and Media Studies in January, traveled to Cuba for the length of Spring break to continue research for his upcoming book, "Guerrilla Marketing: Information War, Capitalism, and Counterinsurgency in Colombia."

The book focuses on the negotiations between the Colombian government and the Revolutionary Armed Forces of Colombia, or FARC, a rebel group that has been fighting for more than 50 years. More specifically, Dr. Fattal writes about the demobilization program used by the government to draw rebels out of the insurgency individually using marketing campaigns and military intelligence operations.

Dr. Fattal describes the book's focus as, "the convergence between tactics, strategies, and practices of marketing on the one hand, and counterinsurgency on the other, and how the two types of expertise are...



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... coming together. Fattal adds, "what is interesting is that advertising, which now is going to great lengths to hide its commercial intent is linking up with a type of warfare that hides its military objectives. I think about it as the intersection of advertising as non-advertising and war as non-war. I am working to develop the concept of 'brand warfare,' which builds off of the double meaning coded into Guerilla Marketing."

During his trip, Dr. Fattal had the opportunity to interview two vital members of the rebel FARC insurgency: one member of the FARC's secretariat, which is the top 7 most powerful people in organization, and its director of media operations, who is playing a fundamental role in preparing for the FARC's possible transition from an armed movement to political life.

After returning from Cuba, Dr. Fattal has noted that the peace talks are in their final stages, but there's still a lot of common ground that needs to be forged. The research from this past trip will contribute to the epilogue of Dr. Fattal's upcoming manuscript, which he plans to complete by the end of 2016.
