The World Stories Alive! Tales in Many Tongues series is back at Schlow Library for its third year this spring. On select Saturday mornings the Community Room of the library is filled with parents and children ages 3-8 eager to learn about the culture and language of a presenter. This year includes sessions in Russian, German, Hindi, Turkish, Japanese, Portuguese, French and Arabic. The Chinese, Spanish, and Hebrew Sessions have already happened and were all huge successes.

Each session includes a children's story read in the chosen language and is followed by a song and a craft that further explore the culture of the people who speak the language. The storyteller reads the story in their native language, explains the stories in English, and encourages the audience to participate in the songs and learn a few useful words. The session on January 25th was the Hebrew session and the presenter, Mike Goldenberg, told one of his favorite childhood stories called *A Tale of Five Balloons*. Then the children were able to sing along to a birthday song in Hebrew and made a craft of the Star of David. At the Spanish session, Xavier Jiménez Cuba read the story *La puerca de Juan Bobo* or *Juan Bobo's Pig*. The sessions will continue until April 12th. See the full schedule on page 3.

Last semester, I lead a club titled "Spanish Culture Club" with the intention of teaching students about my experience studying abroad in Seville, Spain. Although I do not plan on being an educator, I found the experience to be both challenging and rewarding.

Each week I designed a lesson plan that attempted to be educational and fun. Making sure each lesson took up the allotted time was a matter of trial and error. Either the activity took longer than I thought because the kids were enjoying themselves or we finished early because the lesson was not as fun as I had anticipated. As the semester progressed, I gained a better understanding of what the students liked and adjusted my lesson plans based on their interests. In some ways this is easier, however, I look forward to working with another intern because we can work together to enhance the club in various ways. "Global Rhetoric and Global Intersections: The Old and the New"

CGS hosted Professor Joseph L. Jeyaraj of Penn State's English Department for his talk, "Global Rhetoric and Global Intersections: The Old and the New" on Wednesday, January 22nd 2014, as part of the Brown Bag Lecture series.

Offering a simplified definition of globalization as the proliferation of information, Professor Jeyaraj elaborated on both the earlier forms of globalization as well as the issues present in rhetoric around globalization today in light of our move towards becoming a "world without boundaries." The discussion traced the evolution of globalization from the shift from shipping to air transport to the advent of the Internet, and considered how this enables faster communication and increased connections on an intercontinental scale.

Dr. Jeyaraj asserted that these advancements and how they reverberate internationally beg the question: "Who controls the story?" Indeed, the role of rhetoric in globalization is pivotal. The truth of the matter is that new media are controlled in new, sophisticated ways, allowing them to be framed from different angles in accordance with the interests of the source disseminating the message. To illustrate this point, Dr. Jeyaraj presented several case studies. At one particularly demonstrative point, he asked the audience if anyone knew which country had recently deported a quarter of a million inhabitants in under three months. The question was met with silence before Jeyaraj explained the situation unfolding Saudi Arabia, where the government has launched a campaign to deport illegal migrant workers living and working menial jobs in the country. This presented a current and relevant issue, which has largely been swept under the rug by most news outlets. The talk left the audience to ponder the questions: who gets to control the story in this day and age, and, once it is told, which is the version we as consumers, are fed?
