"City of Ghosts" in Happy Valley

When asked "where did you get the courage to fight like this," Alhamza replied, "I simply knew what I was supposed to do."

On September 5th, the Penn State community welcomed Abdalaziz (Aziz) Alhamza, journalist and cofounder of Raqqa is Being Slaughtered Silently, an organization committed to shedding light on the atrocities occurring in Syria and all over the world. His visit commenced with a student lunch, where he passionately spoke about his experiences and his organization. Students asked Alhamza questions about the power of social media and how students can make an impact in the critical situations arising all over the world.

Following lunch, the documentary "City of Ghosts" was screened in Katz Auditorium with about 175 viewers. The film documented the struggle of journalism in ISIS-occupied Raqqa, Syria, following the lives and work of Raqqa is Being Slaughtered Silently journalists. The screening was followed by a discussion with film subject, Alhamza. He spoke about being a college student when ISIS took over Raqqa. Alhamza never considered himself politically involved, however, in the spirit of Arab Spring and seeing danger around him, he began to protest.

He realized the media wasn't covering any of the gross human rights violations or protests, so he and his friends took action. Alhamza spoke of ISIS media tactics and the situation in Syria from a global perspective. According to Alhamza, major powers did not realize ISIS was a threat until they had grown too big to suppress.


Raqqa is Being Slaughtered Silently formed in 2014 to inform the international community of the injustices taking place in Raqqa. According to Alhamza, "the main issue is getting people to know about it." Alhamza and colleagues addressed this issue by recording acts of violence and uploading the videos on their website for public viewing. The footage spread globally, including on major news networks. This act of defiance was incredibly dangerous, causing its members and their families to be targeted by ISIS. Many members fled the country and remain on the move due to ISIS's global following.

The inspiration sparked by Alhamza's presentation encourages the audience to carry on his mission and spread awareness of atrocities.


